Ensuring Clarity and Coherence

Read Aloud Test

Read your entire assignment aloud to identify awkward phrasing, run-on sentences, and unclear transitions. Your ears will catch what your eyes miss.

Paragraph Flow Check

Ensure each paragraph has a clear topic sentence, supporting evidence, and transitions that connect to the next paragraph. Each paragraph should advance your overall argument.

03

Argument Consistency

Verify that your thesis statement aligns with your conclusion and that all body paragraphs support your central argument without contradiction.

Mastering Academic Tone

Key Elements of Academic Tone

- Use third person perspective consistently
- Employ precise, discipline-specific vocabulary
- Maintain objective, evidence-based arguments
- Avoid contractions, colloquialisms, and informal language

Watch for: missing page numbers for quotes, incorrect punctuation, inconsistent formatting, and missing references for in-text citations.


The Five Marking Criteria Breakdown

Referencing

Theory

Knowledge
